It is hard to believe we are already halfway through Term 4 and the end of the school year is in sight!

CLASSES: In the coming week, the school will be finalising classes for 2025. The class structure is formed on anticipated enrolments and estimated funds indicated by the student-centred funding model to employ teaching staff. This is then balanced to best meet the educational needs of our students.

REPORTING: As part of a department-wide initiative to reduce workload for teachers and school leaders, the Department of Education has worked with the School Curriculum and Standards Authority to clarify the requirements for end-of-semester reporting. Last month, the Department clarified the following for 2024 Semester Two reports and onwards:

- There is a requirement to provide an overall teacher comment, the content of which is determined by the school.
- There is no requirement to provide learning area comments (English and Mathematics included).
- There is no requirement to provide grades at the strand or sub-strand level.

Whilst a lot of schools have taken the Department's suggestion on immediately, our staff are in agreeance that this semester our reports will remain the same as previous so that our parents get the benefit of knowing their child's academic progress for the year. Future reports from 2025 onwards will contain:

- A grade for both strand and sub-strands as we believe this is important in communicating precisely the areas contained within a curriculum learning area that students are succeeding in and also the areas that require further support.
- An overall comment that will contain general comments about the student, attitude, behaviour, engagement, and attendance.

Moving into 2025, our plan to communicate individual progress more effectively will include:

- Individual student assessment folders that will contain copies of all assessments administered at a class, school and system level. These will be available for parent meetings.
- 3-Way Conference (Teacher, Student, Parent)
- and a Learning Journey (Open Classroom).

What an amazing school we have. One that is **flourishing** in all aspects. Check out our latest achievements and progress that have happened so far this term on the next page.

After submitting a grant application, our school progressed through to the final stages, and members of the Nature Play Committee sat before a panel for an interview. We are waiting to hear back about the prospects of receiving \$30,000 to go towards the construction of a play space and outdoor learning environment for our students. Fingers crossed as we will hear back this month sometime!

The Admin Team participated in a Wellbeing meeting with a focus on the future direction of our Student and Staff Wellbeing across the school. We are developing a strategic plan to enhance the shared responsibility between families, mental health services, the community and school.

Lego Club has hit Pingelly Primary School with such enthusiasm. We have had so many students engaging with our resources. LEGO clubs can have a significant impact on students' creativity and problem-solving skills. By providing open-ended building activities, LEGO clubs offer students the opportunity to unleash their creativity and imagination.

School Culture Survey 2024

This is the fourth and last reflection from the community perceptions on the domains in the survey. Review of the and Leadership feedback Resource supports the school's ongoing improvement plan that will benefit students and staff. We have looked at this set of data from the "Disagree" perspective and even though it is minimal, as a school we acknowledge that there are still parents and families that have these perceptions. We will continue to work on these areas to change this perception to the positive.

9 parents disagreed that the communication process of the school is well established:

The school has increased the ongoing communications and marketing of our students' success via social media. Our teachers have increased their student learning uploads on Seesaw. The Numbat Newsletter has increased to 3 times a term. We have tightened up our processes around letters and communication going out to parents.

12 parents disagreed that the school communicate children's learning:

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The school values parent involvement in their child's learning and invites parents to meet with their classroom teacher to discuss individual children's learning.

We have worked on a plan moving forward to provide more in-depth communication around assessments to our parents.

10 parents disagreed that they have opportunity to participate in school planning:

The school has both a proactive P & C and School Council of which all parents are invited to volunteer to be involved. The school seeks ongoing input and feedback in regard to planning of school events.

School Council have contributed to the 2025-2027 strategic direction of the school. Parents will be invited to reflect on the 6 domains in upcoming weeks.



12 parents disagreed that the school asks parents what they think:

The school continues to work on engaging the community in making decisions through ongoing surveys, invitations to participate in workshops and opportunities to provide feedback.

Mathematics








